To my siblings in Christ,

He is risen! This is the first proclamation of what we call good news, but not any old good news, it's THE Good News, which in Greek is Gospel. As we approach and soak up that message of resurrected life, it is worthwhile to consider the life that Jesus brings. It is more than a guarantee of a life after death, it is life that is for the here and now. It is life that we describe as real life. It is meant to be lived out in a world where we are bound, broken, and executed every day in sometimes sudden heart stopping ways, and other times as a gradual chipping away and wearing down.

So, what kind of life is Jesus calling us to? Well, there is too much for us to take all of it in, but there are three Greek words in the New Testament that may be translated as life:

bi,oj: (bye-oh-ss) life; livelihood, living; property, possessions.

yuch,: (sue-kay) life; self, inner life, one's inmost being; (physical) life.

zwh,: (z-oh-ey) life; absolute fullness of life, vitality and animation of life.

When the youngest, in the parable of the prodigal son, asks for his inheritance, he asks for the bye-oh-ss (**bi,oj**) (Luke 15:12). He isn't just asking for his share of the stuff, he is asking for his share of his father's livelihood, his life's work. The true nature of our **bi,oj** is something Jesus' parable calls us to reconsider as a source and expression of our sue-kay (**yuch**) and our z-oh-ey (**zwh**). Find the whole parable in Luke 15:11-32

A few weeks back, we read as Jesus contrasted our sue-kay (yuch) in this world with the z-oh-ey (zwh) found by following Jesus. "Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will

keep it for eternal life" (John 12:25). Of course, Jesus is using excessive exaggeration (hyperbole) to make his point. There is an incompatibility between the life and self we are told to pursue in the everyday world around us (yuch,: suekay), and the vital, animated, fullness we are called to receive from Jesus (zwh:z-oh-ey).

Here, the life Jesus is calling us to, begins by steering clear of letting our sense of self be determined by what we do and have in the everyday world. It also involves not becoming so attached to our life in the everyday world that we can't let go of any part of it if needed. Things like power, affluence, position, and connections can be very addictive.

However, Jesus isn't saying that we have to reject everything and everyone, run off to the wilderness, and become hermits. There is a middle ground to be found between selling out and writing off our **yuch**. Your life in the everyday world can't be your source of self, but it should be a place to express your inmost being.

The other side of this is what we are to do with the temptation to make our **yuch** in the everyday world our everything. We must be ready to see it for the dangerous slave master it can easily become. We must know the feeling of when it begins to command our allegiance. In those moments, we need to be ready to reject it like a person who has a food allergy rejects certain ingredients. We should be repulsed by what that way of life in the everyday world can do! It doesn't just get us lost but it can so easily ruin and destroy everything in its path.

This is what we need to be mindful of and intentional about as we follow Jesus, because all of that gets in our way of receiving the life Jesus has and is already giving. It numbs us to its presence. This z-oh-ey (**zwh**) is right there. It is right there, and it is eternal; it doesn't run out or go away. It is fully there all the time and everywhere. And notice that it is tied to this Jesus who calls us to follow and receive. This vitality, animation, and fullness of life is not tied to what we do or what we have. It is not tied to performance, reputation, importance, or influence. It is not limited by age, strength, health, gender, ethnicity, education, or intelligence levels. It is not for members only. This **zwh** simply is and is simply given because he is risen! And that is good news.

That was 12 years ago, and this year will be our 12th workday. In part to remember her, mostly because we feel how important camp can be to kids. Where they can learn about nature, Gods creation, as well as being in the open air, in a safe and caring environment where kids can be kids.

Intern Reflections

Hello and Good Day to all of God's people at Resurrection Lutheran Church! I'm two weeks into my internship here and what a time it has been! When a person first begins the journey of candidacy as a minister of Word and Service (Deacon), they are asked what they intend to specialize in. My answer to that question was "administration and worship." Already, I have been involved in a project related to volunteerism and I have a couple of other projects relating to administration in the works. I look forward to participating in worship and all of the activities that Holy Week brings. I am grateful to Pastor Smith for what he has taught me so far about "everyday ministry" as well as some theological thoughts I had not seen before. Thank you, people of Resurrection who have welcomed my wife and me with open arms. You are indeed a "welcoming" congregation. It is my sincere privilege to be here serving with you.

As I said above, I have been working on a volunteerism project for the youth and actually anyone who wants to participate as a volunteer. Ultimately, we will be able to have a volunteer opportunity every month and project out a few months to see where and when those opportunities will be. This project at this writing has been completed.

Resurrection looks forward to wonderful growth opportunities as the development to the west and north of us comes to completion in the coming months and years. Our question looking forward is exploring what tools other churches have used to manage their growth. I have completed a form which is currently under review to use when having conversations with these churches, all of whom are larger than we are. For the most part, we aren't looking to "copy cat" from these churches, but to understand why they took some of the steps they took. What kind of technology, web services and social media did they grow into? How do they manage their membership rolls? Are there certain apps that worked for them when communicating with their youth? Finally, we want to know what they wished they had known at the beginning of these processes, lessons learned etc.

Finally, as I contemplate our mission statement "Being an example of God's acceptance and grace to all," I'm reflecting on the word "all." Every church sign in some way expresses that "all" are welcome and all too often that "welcome" comes with strings attached. As we begin to experience growth, and people begin checking us out in person, are we really ready to say all? Are we prepared to lavish God's grace on people who don't look like us? Are we prepared to welcome those who have had difficult life experiences? Those experiences that left their families not "Brady Bunch" perfect. Are we prepared to welcome families that are not "traditional?" And what about those brothers and sisters who have made mistakes in life that forced them into the legal system where orange jumpsuits were the uniform of confinement? All, for its three letters, and one of them is doubled, has to be the largest word in human language!

But do you know what? I believe just from the short time that I've been here, that Resurrection Lutheran Church is up to the task of welcoming and loving all who come through the church doors and worship with us online! I believe with all of my heart that this church can see with the eyes of God and love people, all people with the love of Christ. Thank you for being the people of God that you are. You are indeed the "light on the hill" that this world that God loves needs to see and experience!


JAZZERCISE @ RLC
