Our mission: Being an example of God's acceptance and grace to all

To my siblings in Christ,

We are in the season of Easter. Not a singular event on a single day, the impact of Jesus' resurrection ripples out creating events over an extended period after the women's first encounter with the empty tomb. Jesus shows up in many different places to many different people. Each encounter is different, though all are fleeting. Jesus' intent is also different. In some cases, there is a need to address doubt or fear. In others there is a need to remind people of his previous expectation of dying, and how that ties to and fulfills the teachings and prophecies of scripture.

Jesus shows up, and, according to Luke's account in the Gospel and the book of Acts, Jesus' resurrection sets the stage for the next stage of the Kingdom's coming, with the releasing of the Holy Spirit into creation on Pentecost. It is interesting that the Resurrected Jesus doesn't march through Jerusalem as the now unstoppable king of kings. It is interesting that he doesn't march on Rome, the capital of the empire that has occupied Palestine and oppressed the people and the land.

It is interesting that the focus is instead on seeking and restoring his disciples. The ones who had been too dense to comprehend this course of action toward execution. The ones who had deserted him and denied knowing him. Surely, just as he could have marched on the rulers who had killed him, so too, Jesus could have picked new disciples—better disciples—to follow and then carry his message out into the world. But Jesus' resurrection is not a single event on a single day. It is a quilt of people and places impacted by the rippling implications of the empty tomb. Jesus' resurrection becomes the primary lens for understanding God's priorities and goal in the here and now. as well as the people's

scriptures, cultural practices, and heritage.

Those ripples of the Resurrection continue to flow through the everyday world. 2000 years later and we are still able to see the Resurrected Jesus impacting people's lives, delivering communities, and challenging the powers of the world that only know how to march on enemies and monetize the least of these.

Jesus isn't going to march on our enemies, but Jesus also isn't going to replace us with better disciples. He shows up in all kinds of places, to all kinds of different people, with all kinds of goals and intentions. I wonder, as those who follow the Crucified and Risen One, where is the Risen Jesus likely to show up in your everyday world? And what do you figure his goals and intentions are for showing up for you?


