To my siblings in Christ,

I'd like you to take a sightseeing trip with me, not a guilt trip but one of discovery.

In a world that sees God as unimportant and faith as optional, your faith as a way of life is one of the most valuable and powerful things you possess. Even when we reject it, faith is an unavoidable aspect of life as a human being. We cannot avoid putting our faith in things outside of ourselves to give us things like identity, worth, belonging, purpose, and security. Even a proven faith to have no faith in anyone or anything is still faith, and a faith that decides how we live each day.

It is worthwhile to take stock of where we place our faith. Fortunately, there are two valuable ways to get a clear picture of what we actually believe: our bank/credit card statements, and our schedules and calendars. Where you spend your money and your time will tell you everything you need to know. What we prioritize with our money and time is what actually matters to us. What we prioritize with our money and time shows us the little gods we actually trust to be the god who gives us everything that makes up our life and world.

I wonder what your purses and watches—or your purse and watch apps—want to tell you? Again, this is a sightseeing trip of discovery not one of guilt or shame. I would invite you to take some time to look at these as holy texts, and because money and time have no moral or supernatural power by themselves, you should allow them to speak without judgment. They are merely descriptive. We are the ones who assign value to what they say about right/wrong, good/bad, profitable/bankrupting, etc.

Next, I invite you to take some time to do an audit of yourself and your world. What have you acquired with your tools of money and time? What returns have these two tools produced in your heart and soul, in your physical and mental health, in your relationships with other people, and in your impact on the world around you?

As you look, you may find it helpful to place things into three categories:

1. Things that have produced what you may call blessings or health.
2. Things that have produced what you may call bondage or harm.
3. Things that are noticeably absent or in short supply.

This is a form of spiritual practice. A full audit is something that we should pursue from time to time, but a non-abusive daily review is a powerful habit that builds all kinds of resources over time. At the end of the day take some time and begin with category one. Asking for the gift of gratitude and generosity, take an inventory of all the sources of blessing and health you can uncover looking back over the day.

Next, asking for the gift of freedom and courage, take an inventory of all the sources of bondage and harm you can identify from the day. And lastly, take stock of what was absent or in short supply within yourself and in the world around you throughout the day. These we turn over to God to work as the Master Gardener and use as ways to teach us what God wants us to learn about ourselves, about God, and about God's creation.

There is nothing more that you have to do. You will find that everyday is a tall order. You will find too that getting through the whole thing is a big ask. Be kind to yourself as you try this on, and don't make it something that has to be long or perfect. You can do it in 3 minutes, and you can linger for a lifetime. Sometimes you will feel like it doesn't "do" anything, and other times it may feel silly. Sometimes you will realize that it's been more than

a day since you went for this sightseeing trip.

In all times, it is important to keep in mind that it is essential to do this regularly. But, in the face of all these situations of shortcoming, it is more important to celebrate what the moment of realization truly is. That moment of realization that we need to take this sightseeing trip through our day is actually two things. The realization is seeing God inviting you to take a walk with God, and the realization is also a moment of clarity when we remember that we value that walk with God.

May you find the journey filling you, and may the path become rutted with your regular and life filled steps.

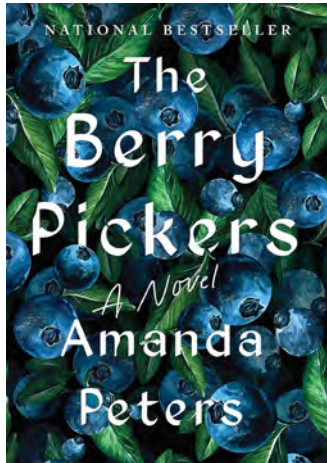
Other Summer Camp Opportunities with LOMIK

Reconciling in Christ (RIC)

Since 1983, the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Program has been a public way for faith communities to see, name, celebrate, and advocate for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions in the Lutheran church.

The RIC Program is made up of congregations, synods, colleges, seminaries, outdoor ministries, and other Lutheran organizations.

The purpose of the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Program is to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions; work for racial equity and commit to anti-racist work; and to support the national program.

Last year we put together a team, working on the process to become a Reconciling in Christ

Congregation, so that all of our members and guests will know that they are welcome and included in all parts of the life and ministry at Resurrection.

Our team is just finishing up a book study on the book “Those 7 References” By John F. Dwyer. Those 7 verses, are the most used verses against our LGBTQIA+ siblings. We will discuss and learn what is actually taking place in those verses. We were blessed to have someone from the team donate several copies of the book. If you would like to borrow a copy to read, please look for the books at the Welcome Center. Once done please return the book so others can use it as well.

We will then be meeting during Fellowship Hour on March 22nd and March 29th to discuss those 7 verses. There will be time for questions and answers as well.

Church family, it's a joy to share an update on our Stephen Minister training — a program that equips caring believers to walk alongside people who are hurting and to bring Christ's love in a personal, confidential way.

Over the past four months, our trainees have been deepening their understanding of what it means to care in Jesus' name.

We began with The Person of the Caregiver, exploring how every act of care flows from a heart rooted in Christ. From there, they studied Feelings: Yours, Mine, and Ours, learning that our emotions are part of how God brings healing and wholeness to His people.

The next step was The Art of Listening — perhaps one of the most sacred skills we can offer another person in pain. They practiced being fully present, listening without judgment, and helping others share their stories. Following that, in Distinctively Christian Caring, they learned how to draw on prayer, scripture, and spiritual resources to bring God's peace into every conversation, always remembering that the Stephen Minister is the caregiver, and God is the Caregiver.

As the weeks continued, they studied A Process Approach to Caring — learning that our role is not to “fix” a person's problems but to faithfully walk beside them while trusting God to bring results. Sessions on Assertiveness helped them find the balance of speaking truth in love, while Maintaining Boundaries. Crisis Theory and Practice taught

them how to care wisely, ensuring both the caregiver and care receiver are supported. They have discussed Confidentiality—a cornerstone of Stephen Ministry—and have even considered how to care well between visits, using technology thoughtfully when needed.

Looking toward the next stretch of training, our class will explore Using Mental Health Professionals

and Community Resources, Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief, Caring for Those with Depression, and Understanding Suicide. These lessons equip our Stephen Ministers to respond compassionately in some of life's most difficult circumstances, helping them recognize when professional care is needed and how to walk alongside others through loss, sadness, or despair—always as visible reminders of God's loving presence.

Friends, your continued prayers and encouragement mean so much to these trainees. Their willingness to serve, to learn, and to grow is a witness to the Spirit at work among us. We're grateful for the way God is shaping this ministry, and we look forward to the day these Stephen Ministers will be commissioned to care for our congregation, one heart at a time.
