"Being an example of God's acceptance and grace to all."

Can you see? This is the theme we are using on our Lenten journey toward Good Friday's cross and Easter's empty tomb. Lent is a time of intentional reflection when we are asked to reflect on our own faith, our lived lives, our perceptions of God, and our relationship with God and one another. The assigned readings for Sundays on our journey take us through the books of Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Deuteronomy, Psalms, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Matthew, Mark, and John. There we find all kinds of references to seeing and miracles of sight and vision. We also encounter a wide collection of images and stories of God, God's people, and their relationship. All of these create opportunities for us to reflect on our sight.

As a leg in that journey, I offer you a little of my own reflection process. One of my passions is words. I find it helpful and extremely interesting to study words. Words are such powerful things that the combination of sounds can transmit meaning from one person to another. Such flexible things that tone or context can cause them to take on wildly different meaning. Such magical things that to scribe certain shapes onto a physical surface like stone, or paper, or even a digital screen, can preserve meaning for as long as the surface remains. So powerful that they can continue to hold their meaning long after the ability to read them has disappeared.

Let's take a minute to reflect on that word, see. According to Merriam Webster, that word, see, can mean: to perceive, to be aware of, to come to know, to examine, to find acceptable, to visit, to accompany, to meet. We start with a simple verb that means exactly what it means, and we place it into a simple sentence creating a question, "can you see?" We read it and then we consider its meaning in our spiritual reflections during this Lenten journey: Can you see the Kingdom of God around you? Can you

see yourself as a disciple of Jesus? Can you see your place as a servant citizen of God's Kingdom and a member of God's family? Can you see your relationship with God and its many branches and roots out into the world and other people? Can you see Emmanuel, God with Us? Can you see? What do you see? What would you like to see?

But now, let's allow that simple word, see, to take us on another journey. In fact, let's allow it to take us on many different journeys. In turn, replace that meaning of sight with the eye with the different meanings. "Can you see?", becomes, can you perceive, be aware of, come to know, examine, find acceptable, visit, accompany, and meet?

The words in Greek and Hebrew that we translate as, see, are **o`ra,w** (oh-RAH-oh) and ha'r' (RAH-ah). Their brief definitions are:

- o`ra,w (oh-RAH-oh): to see, to perceive, to behold, to take heed.
- ha'r' (RAH-ah): to see, to appear, to show, to cause to see.

Like crystals in a kaleidoscope, the slightest shift allows simple words to create new landscapes along our Lenten path. They have the power to carry us off in directions we never considered, and they create sight for our eyes, minds, hearts, and souls. Can you see? What do you see? What would you like to see? What is God inviting you to see? I invite you to continue to journey with us through the Sundays and Thursday evenings throughout Lent. Then I request that you make every effort to join us during the last week of March as we tell and see the stories of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and on to Easter!


BOOK CLUB
