## The Alternative Life of Faith Continuing from October and November

To know fear is human, but to be governed by it is an affront to God's kingdom. To be proud of being a Christian and a United States citizen is good, but to attempt to make any worldly nation a Christian nation is both dangerous and idolatrous. The contemporary narratives about our national identity, which some are calling Christian Nationalism, are not about faith but about power—and they are nothing new.

It creates urgency by ginning up fear, claiming that Christianity is under attack and must be protected and championed by the government to save civilization. It is a tool used to control by creating issues, assigning blame, and limiting our ability to connect with the "other" for communication, collaborative problem-solving, and community building. Without exception, a narrative that combines fear and Christianity is always a whitewashing of the ends that justify the means of some group's play for power. Fear is never a tool for Christians. It is a temptation to be avoided and one of the major planks Christians must doggedly seek God's help in removing from our eyes, hearts, minds, and souls.

One way to identify narratives of fear is their hyper-focus on issues while avoiding the underlying problems. (Abortion is an example of an issue. The systems that create greater obstacles for victims, the poor, pregnant women, and children in the foster care system are examples of underlying problems.) Narratives about issues are concerned with assigning blame and being right, and they foster distrust, division, and greater fear. The much harder, less gratifying work of addressing the problems requires us to be more concerned with solutions than with being

right. It requires us to seek collaboration with the "other" out of necessity for the sake of change. Yet it also creates shared purpose by drawing from hope.

Here is one of many places where the life of faith liberates and obligates us in today's world. As a response to narratives of fear that spur reactions, the daily life of

faith can be slow to anger and opinion because trusting God to guide creates space to breathe and requires us to prioritize stillness and quiet to listen. It can be present and vulnerable with others because its resilience comes from trusting God to be our only true source of strength, deliverance, and self.

The daily life of faith rearranges our priorities, shifts our perspective, and changes the narrative of our story and the story of creation. It is at odds with the everyday world because it refuses its games, its rules, and its prizes. Humility, for example, is not a sign of weakness. It does not come from self-rejection. It is graciously born as we awaken to the self that is a child of God and servant citizen of God's kingdom. That self does not give time or energy to the world's understanding, approval, or respect, so it is free and empowered to quietly play God's games by the Kingdom's rules. Humility comes from learning

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to trust the true prizes of real worth: purpose, belonging, identity, and unending life. It comes by serving others on their path to knowing the same gifts of God.

This life of faith prizes wisdom that is the received Holy Spirit, which imparts things like the peace that passes understanding. It is a wisdom that comes from an eternal lifetime of practicing the ways of God. God calls us to a way that values compassion over winning. It is a way resolved to loving whenever love is made to compete with what we thought was right, good, or holy. It is a way that honors God by serving the world's losers. It invests in God's economy of grace by

treasuring what the world deems trash. It worships God by quietly caring for the dignity of those who will never be able to repay us in any way. It is a way of life—a life of faith—that is so very relevant and needed in today's world.

It is for us to lean into the promises of God and step out in faith to offer the world a different picture of who it is because of who we are—not Christian nationalists, but a People of the Way, living a life of faith in a nation where we are free to be and do just that.

To lend a hand, please sign up at the welcome center, call the office or follow the link below. It takes many people to make our Christmas Eve services special!



The youth will be playing **Christmas Bingo on December 21st from 11-1**.


