Our mission: Being an example of God's acceptance and grace to all

Continuing from last month's article:

We make the mistake of assuming that a word is unchanging. The reality is that definitions may not change, but a word depends on the goals of the speaker, the mindset of the listener, and the context of their being used to give them so much of their meaning and power. Among other things, words distinguish one thing from another, creating opportunities to elevate likeness and otherness. If you look at all the polarization today, it is clear what has been elevated by words. Words like Christian, nationalism, and patriot have been used as weapons to create division and stir up mistrust and fear.

The thing is, as Christians, Jesus commands us to tend to the 2x4 in our own eye instead of scoffing at the 2x4 in our neighbor's. Each of us has been impacted in our positions, opinions, and perspectives by the agendas of the fear sowers and their words. The actual underlying problems may be very real, but the emphasis of division is not on problems, it is on issues. It is not on solutions but on assigning blame. It is more concerned with being right instead of doing good. We have all turned to these idols, and this is especially true when we withdraw out of apathy or hopelessness. But why? It is the way of fear.

We know that fear is a response that is rooted in the most basic parts of ourselves. It primes us to respond quickly and energetically. We also know that fear can be manufactured and that people in a state of fear are easier to influence. From a place of fear, we are naturally primed to assign blame for the threat. Communication and understanding become far more difficult in a place of fear because we are primed to defensive stances. In a place of fear, distrust is natural, but it can be further manipulated to the point of

dehumanizing the "other" in our minds.

It always starts small, often beginning by pointing out an attribute or characteristic that is different, which can then be used to make fun of the "otherness" with name calling and jokes. Clothing, income, employment, education, accents, religion, foods, and cultural practices

are typical source material. The hazard is that the seemingly harmless, silly and funny joke making and name calling can easily transform the "other" from different into inferior, which can transition into seeing them as less than human. The transformation is usually slow and subtle until it isn't. My WWII era grandpa didn't arrive overnight at his perspective on the Japanese as "Nips", and it wasn't purely spontaneous when our nation decided to place Japanese Americans in internment camps.

Fear has no place in the kingdom of God, and it is not a tool to be wielded by Christians. Fear, and only as an overwhelming awe, may be found in the presence of God Almighty alone. Again and again we hear it in the Bible. For example, "I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go." (Joshua 1:9) Jesus tells a parent, "Do not fear, only

believe." (Mark 5:36) 1 Peter tells us not to fear what others fear. (3:14) And 1 John 4:18 says,

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear..."

But the Bible is only a foundation for the actions of faith, so we must be careful how we use quotes. It is not an unquestionable book of clear answers. It is a tool that the Holy Spirit uses to work faith in us. God desires faith not being right. Paul, quoting Habakuk, says repeatedly that the righteous will live by faith (not by quoting scripture). Faith opens us to the eternal life that the Holy Spirit calls us to live out of in the hereand-now. Faith calls us to know certain things like that we are held by God's love because of God's grace; that our identity, value, belonging, and purpose come from that love; that our hope and joy are found in God's promise; and that God is the source of every provision that is actually secure.

This is why any narrative that tries to gin up fear by casting Christianity as being under threat or a victim of assault is suspect. The foundation of the faith is in a God and kingdom that cannot be threatened. It can certainly be misused and misrepresented but never threatened. Jesus does not need our protection. God does not need us to preserve God's authority. Even in places where the church is openly persecuted the church persists. So, the narratives of threat and persecution as a reason for action to protect Christianity is nothing more than a whitewashing of actions that serve other agendas and plays for power. This same awareness is needed when Christian nationalism is used to gin up fear in others. We, as Christians, must reject the 2x4 of fear in ourselves. These narratives point to issues, not the actual problems. Conversations about problems focus on solutions, those about issues focus on blame and being right. One creates opportunity for collaboration and draws from hope. The other fosters distrust and division and grows fear.

It is time for us to lean into this way of things, this slow, vulnerable, yet resilient, way of prioritizing humility, wisdom, compassion and resolve: the way of faith. We will look at what that way of faith looks like next month.

The asphalt paths have been completed and the dirt around them has been graded and seeded.


