Christian, Nationalism, Patriot.

What are we to do in today's world with people screaming, through every channel possible, words and themes that are meant to scare and enrage? The powerful are using their treasures of wealth, technology, professionals, and webs of influence to hijack our emotions and chosen identity markers to serve their own agendas and goals. It is a world where algorithms and the profit driven determine much of the information we receive, and the ignorant, conspiracists, and extremists can amplify their voice around the world. It is a world where we are still humans that wrestle with our personal limitations, vices, and brokenness. In this soup how are we to know what thoughts are our own? What is really spurring our emotions? Is any of it true? What is a Christian to do? As a Christian and an American, I continue to prayerfully listen to the noise and to sit in silence, and I have discerned some things that have been helpful to me.

First, let's look at those three words because the way that they get thrown around is very problematic. Christian, according to Merriam-Webster, is one who professes belief in the teachings of Jesus. The problem is that Christians vehemently disagree about what Jesus' teachings call us to prioritize, believe and do. Nationalism, according to Merriam-Webster, is an ideology that elevates one nation, its culture and interests, above all others. The problem with nationalism is threefold. First, Christians' nationality is God's reign, God's kingdom. It has no borders. Second, the culture of our nationalism is servanthood, and our national interest is with justice, mercy, and care for the least of us. Third, unless people recognize collaboration and equality as essential to every culture and interest, nationalism will always lead to conflict between countries. How Christians' actual nationalism influences American values is

penned in the first line of the Declaration of Independence and inscribed on the Statue of Liberty. Patriot, according to Merriam-Webster, is one who loves and supports their country. The problem with patriotism is that love can make people do crazy and sometimes hateful things. It is problematic when it leads to ends justifying means and

unfair relationships with other peoples. It is also problematic when it gets used to elevate a certain way of loving country while demonizing another. Words matter. How they are used matters. Why particular words are used matters. We must listen closely whenever people use these three words, ESPECIALLY when they are being used by people with whom we find ourselves agreeing.

All that said, there is only one Christian nation, and it is not the United States, and it is not only for Christians. Christians are called to bless the world's nations in which they live. Christians are called to be active in their systems of government to advance the causes of justice and mercy. They are to live out their faith in the everyday world by loving their neighbor with an emphasis on the marginalized and vulnerable. No amount of grandstanding will change this reality or these obligations.

A Christian American, active in worldly politics, first recognizes the first amendment rejection of any one religions marriage to government as a good thing. If we were to determine that the US was to be a Christian nation, we would first have to determine which flavor of Christian that would be, and I am not comfortable with anyone besides Jesus himself making that decision. But if we did, it would require us to erase every law and system of power that did not conform completely to the only two laws we could ever have: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your might AND your neighbor as yourself. It would require our reputation around the world to be founded on our love for one another, not our might or wealth. It would require the beatitudes to be posted in every courtroom, government building and classroom

(Luke 6:20-26), not the ten commandments. And citizenship would require living out all of Matthew chapters 5-7 and Luke chapter 6. I encourage you to read those for yourself.


Both your freedom in this nation and this denomination of Christian mean that you do not have to conform to my reflection. I do not offer it as the answer to what is a very complex set of issues. I hope, however, that it offers you some ideas that help you reflect on your own thoughts and feelings. I hope that it can add to the world of finding common ground around the common good and an increase of civil discourse and individual character and conduct.
